## *Staying In Touch*

The spiritual exploration theme at First Parish this month is “Money and the Spirit of Love”

In January my family and I decided to take a month off from being consumers. To begin with we were weary from our own participation in the winter holiday scene. Despite what we most deeply wish about it, we often succumb to over-do. There, I've said it. I have confessed! And, we would like to make our lifestyle match our values more closely. This is not easy in a country screaming at us at every moment to define ourselves by our ability to consume. And, if we are honest, the American Dream that was handed to us from our parents is increasingly a reality of the past. Many of us are struggling and juggling.

We decided that we would buy only necessary groceries and gas. Anything else that could wait would. We would not stop for coffee, but carry our own. Our plastic bucket sprung a leak and we realized that we could use a big pan. This does not mean that we won't ever buy a bucket. It just means that we wanted to teach ourselves something about what is necessary and what isn't. Personally, this boundary gets blurred for me quite a lot. I believe it does for most of us.

So...what was it like? I was surprised at how heavenly it was! I put a sign on my desk saying “You are free from being a consumer this month.” Every time I saw it I breathed a sigh of relief. I realized how impulsive some of my buying is. I found myself with more time since I was hardly in stores at all.

This is an exercise that is meant for the more financially privileged. It is not trying to make a statement about how “meaningful” being poor is, or how much less a poor person needs to survive. Rather it helped me realize my addiction to a self-definition that I would rather not have. It seemed to free up some of my psychic energy (and monetary energy!) to be spent in ways that are more about how to live my UU faith in the world, and how to have the time for more human connection and joy.

Give it a try. Let me know how it goes for you. I wonder if you will feel free too.

I suppose it had to get covered over sometime. I don't mind the snow covering my lawn, or my driveway, but I must say I get a little perturbed when it covers my labyrinth.

Since beginning my internship last autumn I have become a passionate labyrinth walker. Every time I come up to Vernon St. I walk the labyrinth. It has become for me a joy and a vital spiritual practice, an intentional way to help me focus on the business at hand after a long drive. The labyrinth affords me a physical transition into my ministry amongst you. In fact, at the entryway to the labyrinth there are three bricks unlike the rest; at each one I stop and ask myself a question:

1. Am I fully here at this moment; body, mind and spirit?
2. What lesson will this day bring?
3. What is my ministry to these good people today?

With life's demands often causing us to split our attention between the big picture and our daily bread, it seems that an ongoing investment in one's own religious and spiritual development is essential. When in Framingham I add a special labyrinth practice to my daily reading and prayer life. The labyrinth allows me to move with building purpose and challenges me to see, with each now familiar turn, a new view. As I walk, I can take an up-to-date spiritual temperature. With each step I can feel, and in some ways measure, how well I am balancing my immediate concerns and passing emotions with the steady faith and evolving beliefs that provide sustenance throughout my days.

I wonder how hard it would be to put some kind of heating element under the gravel of my precious labyrinth?

## Religious Education

The second semester of religious education started last Sunday, and all of the classes, with the exception of *Our Whole Lives*, have new teachers. The Preschool/Kindergartners are continuing to use the curriculum *We Are Many, We Are One*, where they explore sharing, cooperation, emotions, family, and our natural world. Our first and second graders are learning about our principles and sources and the big questions in life that people wonder about in the *Beginning Unitarian Universalism* curriculum. In *Hebrew Scripture Stories*, the third and fourth graders are exploring the Hebrew part of the Bible and learning how some of the themes of these ancient stories are still relevant today. Fifth and sixth graders are learning about many aspects of loss and how people handle loss from a UU perspective in the *Dealing with Death* curriculum. Seventh and eighth graders are continuing their human sexuality curriculum, *Our Whole Lives*. If you have any questions about any curricula or about our philosophy of religious education here at First Parish, please contact me, and we'll have a conversation.

The RE schedule for February includes some changes from regular classes. On February 5<sup>th</sup>, we will have a Justice Sunday when preschool/kindergartners through sixth graders will be all together working on a social justice project. On February 19<sup>th</sup>, we will have a "Special Sunday", which are Sundays that fall on 3-day weekends. Preschool/kindergartners through sixth graders have a special activity in the Huntley Room, and seventh/eighth graders are invited to attend the worship service on those days. On both Justice Sundays and Special Sundays, the Early Preschoolers have their regular class.

Stay tuned for a fun multigenerational event that will be coming up in March and last throughout the month – "Mystery Friends" hosted by the Religious Education Council. More information on this community-building event will follow in the next newsletter.

## *From The Parish Historian*

### **Samuel D. Robbins**

I have written about all the First Parish ministers who served in the Civil War in some capacity. To end this series, I would like to provide some information about the ninth minister who served throughout the Civil War at First Parish. Samuel D. Robbins was born in 1812, and ordained in 1833, another Harvard graduate. He was the minister at First Parish from 1854 to 1867.

Samuel Robbins presided over a particularly difficult time for First Parish according to Reverend Charles Gaines\*. When he was called in January, 1854 only 16 members were present to vote, with 13 yeas and 1 nay. Here is an excerpt from the letter Robbins sent accepting the position:

“After much deliberation & a careful inquiry into the state of feeling among you, I am satisfied that the interests of your society will be best secured by my acceptance; which I cordially tender you. As to the amount of salary voted me; although I am sure it is wholly inadequate, I prefer under the present circumstances of the Parish, to leave the matter for your future consideration & final action. I am wholly willing to trust myself to your sense of right & your affection towards me for my fitting maintenance.”

Robbins starting salary was \$800 per year but the church did increase it by \$200 within two years. However, in 1862 he was willing to reduce his annual salary by \$100, a considerable sum at the time. This era was one of the major turning points in the First Parish history and Robbins must have been dedicated to the Church to make this kind of a major sacrifice. According to a Charles Gaines sermon, in the late 1850's “The Parish just about dissolved.” Badly needed repairs to the Parish House (a reoccurring theme throughout First Parish history) were voted down and” the Standing Committee resigned.” A Middlesex Justice of the Peace called for a new meeting where new officers were elected and repairs to the meeting house were approved.\*

Over the course of his career at First Parish Samuel D. Robbins was also a member of the Framingham School Committee. At some point in his career he was also Chaplain for the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

Robbins left First Parish in 1867 and retired from the ministry in 1873. He died in 1884 and is buried in Framingham.
